



## Neighbourhood Profiles<sup>4</sup>

- **NYANGA** is a densely populated neighbourhood, with over 96 000 residents. The vast majority of people are Xhosa speaking, black South Africans. Just under half of households are formal dwellings. There are an estimated 4 800 children below 7 years in Nyanga.
- **HANOVER PARK** is a densely populated neighbourhood, home to over 41 500 residents. Almost all residents are Coloured South Africans, and most speak Afrikaans. Most households are formal dwellings. There are an estimated 2 300 children below 7 years in Hanover Park.
- **MONWABISI PARK** is a fast growing informal settlement and home to over 35 000 people. Almost all residents are Black South African, born in the Eastern Cape and speak Xhosa. Almost all households live in informal dwellings. There are an estimated 2 500 children below 7 years in Monwabisi Park.
- **GUGULETHU** is an established, densely populated neighbourhood and home to about 66 300 people. The vast majority of people are Xhosa speaking, black South Africans. The majority of households are formal dwellings. There are an estimated 3 300 children below 7 years in Gugulethu.
- **BONTEHEUWEL** is a neighbourhood with high population density, home to just under 55 000 people. The majority of residents are Coloured, Afrikaans-speaking and South African. The majority of households live in formal housing. There are an estimated 2 750 children below 7 years in Bonteheuwel.
- **KUYASA** is a densely populated neighbourhood in Khayelitsha, home to just under 28 000 residents. Almost all residents are Black South African and speak Xhosa. Most households living in formal dwellings. There are an estimated 1 700 children below 7 years in Kuyasa.
- **MANENBERG** Manenberg is a high-density neighbourhood with a population of about 74 000 people. The majority of people are Coloured, Afrikaans speaking South Africans. The majority of households are formal dwellings. There are an estimated 3 900 children below 7 years in Manenberg.
- **HARARE** is part of Khayelitsha, and home to over 50 000 residents. Almost all are Xhosa-speaking black South Africans, with the majority born in the Eastern Cape. Half of households live in informal dwellings. There are an estimated 2 500 children below 7 years in Harare.
